From the Governor's Desk

How's the PMS factor in your club? You know... Pale, Male and Stale? When a person visits your club, maybe thinking about joining, or coming as a speaker or friend, and they cast their eye around the room, what do they see? A mix of younger and older Rotarians, maybe a couple of different colors, and a nice male/female balance? Certainly, if the visitor is younger, they expect to see a mix. When they don't it really stands out in their mind.

All of us who are members of this great organization of Rotary understand that in order to survive we need to attract new and younger members to our ranks. Yet one of the attraction strategies we often overlook is integration with Rotary's youth programs.

Rotary has a built in 'ladder' of development in the organization allowing us to engage young members at all ages. EarlyAct, InterAct and Rotaract can engage young potential members from grade school through college and early adulthood.

Part of our goal to get new young members is to get the word out of what Rotary is, what it does and the impact we have on our community both locally and globally.

I recently spoke with a friend of mine who did not know what Rotary was all about, and so I showed him the Four Way Test, explaining how this guides what we think, do and say. We chatted about it and he said: "Yeah! That is really good!" My friend then went on to donate to Rotary and is looking at clubs in his area to join.

We need to live and talk Rotary and encourage young people to join us in whatever capacity. Then it's much easier to encourage them to become members.

All of us know and interact with younger people our kids, our grandkids, and people at our workplaces. As people see how they can join with us to help their communities and at the same time enjoy the fellowship of likeminded individuals, they will be much more likely to commit to membership. Think about visiting your local high school and inviting young people, maybe the student government leaders or the international club to join Rotarians in your next community project. How about the various youth levels at your church? Is there a solid after school program in your nearby diverse neighborhood? Consider coordinating through them to clean their park, and then ask them to help clean yours.

For young folks to believe in us, we have to live Rotary not just talk Rotary. Because Rotary is a way of life, not another activity or thing to do. We need to get Rotary into individuals, not just individuals into Rotary.

RI President Shekhar Mehta's primary theme this year is: Be one, Bring One and Serve To Change Lives. At your next club meeting ask the person next to you if they can think of a way to engage with youth and change a life or two. We can do this!



Forty-three years ago, the Salem Rotary Club sponsored an April Fool's Day Race to raise money for its Rotary Foreign Student Exchange Program. Each year inviting one of the Salem Washington Academy senior class organizations to help to run the race, making the event a Rotary club and Salem school project. The school and community have benefited from hosting a visiting exchange student and from sending a Salem student to participate in a Rotary student exchange program in another country. Unfortunately, COVID cancelled the exchange program as well as the race these past two years, but this year the return of the Rotary exchange program, a healthier society and good weather made for a successful race. Rotarian Dan Sheldon, who has run the race since 1979, said, "279 spectators and runners enjoyed the 41st event this year, and of them, "90 ran in the 1-mile race, 55 ran in the 5K race, and 34 ran in the 10K race." In April 1912, the unsinkable Titanic, hit an iceberg and sank to the bottom of the Atlantic Ocean. Today, that event is celebrated as ancient history where one era clashed and changed into another. Roughly one week after the maritime disaster, a meeting took place at the office of George S. DeRouville, a wholesale clothing executive, who introduced and explained a new concept to a group of businessmen in the city of Albany, NY.

This idea, called Rotary had been suggested to George by his cousin who visited a newly established club in Syracuse and liked what he saw. Impressed, the men urged George to write Chicago and get more information and literature on how to start a local club.

A gentleman named Burton Pfeifer was personally appointed by Paul Harris to contact the Albanians. On

April 25, 1913, he addressed the potential members, telling them Rotary was a group of business and professional people who gathered to exchange ideas about their professions and provide "service" to the community. Receiving their May 1, 1913, charter from RI President Glen C Mead on May 9, 1913, at The Hotel Ten Eyck, one member told the 50 plus invited guest that, "The chapter of the Rotary Club is not formed to take active part in civic enterprises and interfere with the activities of older organizations. We are simply members of a mutual improvement society and will not participate in public affairs unless asked to do so by the older institutions." By the end of the first year the Albany Club had grown to over 154 members. It was and is the cornerstone of all future Rotary growth in what became District 7190.

In a vote taken by the Glens Falls Club on the issue of allowing women to join Rotary clubs, roughly 7 years before the Supreme Court of the United States rule in their favor, 76% of the members felt it was okay for each club to determine if women be allowed to join. When asked if women should be allowed to join the Glens Falls club, 68.1 % voted against the proposition.

"Yes, that's what they told me. I was the first Rotarian to come in here pregnant and deliver a child while I was a Rotarian. So, for me, it was always important to make family part of Rotary." Jean Lapper (Former club president 2005-2006) Interview December 13, 2007

At the same time Dwight Marvin from the Troy club was putting together the finishing touched to the Glens Falls club, his club mate John (Jack) Knickerbocker was conferring with a group of prospective Rotarians at his home in Ballston Spa. Jack lived in Ballston Spa but commuted to Troy where he ran a family foundry. Many of the new recruits were solidly on-board but there were a few murmurs of dissent. Knickerbocker stressed the positive aspects of what Rotary meant for their community business and the good things they could do for the community. Through his efforts, those who were reluctant overcame their hesitancy and 24 men agreed to signup and apply for a charter.

They elected Irving W Wiswall the first president and began gathering at the Pleasant Street Community House. Sharing the same "official" charter

date of May 1, 1922, with Glens Falls, Ballston Spa became club number 1190, with Glens Falls being designated club 1180. The charters were signed by District Governor J. Lyle Kinmouth, the last Governor of the old district 3. Shortly after the twin's formation they were both assigned to district 29, which included Eastern New York, Long Island and the island of Bermuda.

Saratoga Springs was the fourth Rotary club charter between the months of April and May 1924. The Saratoga club came into existence through the efforts, once again, of Ballston Spa president Jack Knickerbocker, now known as the "Daddy of Rotary in the Capital District area."

Initial club president Dr. Robert Rockwell commented, "So, it was not surprising that the Ballston Spa Club was our sponsor. From the very onset, our club was influenced by our friend Jack Knickerbocker. He enunciated the principle, 'No meeting must ever rely for enthusiasm on liquor and no unworthy jest should be told by any speaker at a Rotary meeting.' He advised that the meetings should start on time."

The Saratoga Rotarians we anxious of spreading the word by sponsoring another club. The possibility of forming a club in Corinth was suggested at a meeting held in May 1925. However, another 30 years passed before this dream became a reality.

Rotary Club of Hudson Falls

On February 23, 1925, 20 years after the initial start of Rotary in Chicago, a meeting was called by

Glens Falls Rotarians Thomas Remsen, J. Thacher Sears and Russell Carson, traveled to Hudson Falls to interview prospective members for a new club in that village. By April 22, they had enough recruits for the issuance on May 6, 1925. District Governor Alexander Caven traveled from Poughkeepsie on May 22, to present the 23 new Rotarians at a dinner held in the St. Mary's Great Hall. Over 100 people from Granville, Mechanicville, Troy, Poughkeepsie and Glens Falls witnessed the event.

In January 1949, Hudson Falls District Governor E. Victor (Vic) Wiley wrote in his newsletter, "It is important that we review our history and growth once in a while, just to refresh our memories and renew the faith in this movement we know as Rotary International. None of us can ever know too much about Rotary, and most of us know too little."

"The Hudson Falls Rotary Club Bloodmobile team reported 114 donors collected 106 pints of blood, much better than they had expected." Historians Report 1973-1974

Remember our fallen heros. They are the reason that we are free.

The Rotary Club of Glove Cities

Applied for merger in December 1992 combining the Rotary Club of Johnstown (June 12, 1929) and Gloversville (May 15, 1946). Per tradition, the oldest chartered club date becomes the new charter date for the merged clubs.

The Rotary Club of Wilton

Charter date May 15, 2002. Sponsored by Saratoga Springs, NY Rotary Club.

In 2001, Rotary International eliminated territorial boundaries for clubs. This was an effort to open areas around the country that had traditionally been assigned to individual clubs. Places like New York City had for years denied any other new Clubs within the City Limits. This change did have an effect in the Saratoga area where a group of interested members wanted to establish a breakfast club within the city limits of Saratoga. This opened some serious discussions between District 7190 and R.I. In an effort to deflect the proposed breakfast club, Saratoga began an effort to establish a similar breakfast club just outside the city limits of Saratoga in Wilton.

After being overruled by R.I., Governor Quatrini presented the charter to the new breakfast club of Racing City in January 2002. By May 2002, Governor Quatrini presented a second charter to Wilton Club President Robert Rice accepting.

In attendance at the charter dinner held at the Gideon Putnam Hotel on May 31st, was R.I. Director Don Osburn, along with several other special dignitaries. Although the background surrounding the formation of Racing City and Wilton were unusual, it did point out that by eliminating territorial boundaries and making some basic alterations to the rules, over 60 additional Rotarians were found in a community that believed no more growth was possible.

Think About It

What is DEI?

What is DEI? This is a question in a lot of peoples' minds when they hear the term DEI. Let's first start by expanding the acronym, it stands for Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. Now let's go a step further and explain a little bit about what each of those words means. According to Merriam Webster dictionary:

Diversity is the condition of having or being composed of different elements or qualities;

Inclusion the action or state of including or of being included within a group or structure;

Equity is the quality of being fair and impartial or the value of the shares issued by a company.

Malcolm Forbes once said Diversity is the art of thinking independently together. When we speak of DEI we refer to diversity as the presence of differences. Differences that may include race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, nationality, socioeconomic status, language, religious commitment, political perspective, and accessibility as in vision, hearing and speech, cognitive, mobility, age. This is by no means an exhaustive list but it should at least give you an idea of where we are going. *Is it Fair to All concerned.*

Equity is our ACTION element. It is promoting justice, impartiality and fairness within the procedures processes and distribution of resources by institutions or systems. Equity is the creation of access for everyone, no matter their diversity. Will it be Beneficial to All concerned.

Inclusion is an outcome to ensure those that are diverse actually feel and or are welcomed. Inclusion outcomes are met when you, your institution and your program are truly inviting to all to the degree to which diverse individuals are able to participate fully in the decision-making process and development opportunities to participation in activities and event within an organization or group. Will it Build Goodwill and Better Friendships.

Now, if you have been paying attention you know the answer to this next question. So how/where does DEI fit in Rotary? The answer: The Four Way Test, yes, it is really that simple. Since 1943, the Four Way Test

has been a foundation for Rotarians around the world, in their businesses and personal lives. It is a guiding mantra and a gauge given each Rotarian to apply in all that they do. So you see DEI is not new to Rotary, but as with all things we must continue to learn and practice and adjust our skills in an everchanging world. Soup

Lasopy (page 45)

Madagascar Vegetable Soup

From the region of District 9220/ Madagascar

4 lbs. veal bones

3 quarts water

2 tablespoons salt

Add:2 small turnips, peeled and cut into chunks

8 scallions, cut in large pieces

4 carrots, peeled and cut into 2-inch pieces

1 cup string beans

1 cup tomatoes, cut in chunks

½ teaspoon black pepper

In a 5-quart pot, simmer the veal bones, water and salt for one hour with the pot closed. Now add the turnips, scallions, carrots, string beans, tomato and black pepper. Simmer for about one hour or until vegetables are tender. Remove the veal bones. Puree the vegetables. Serve thick and hot from the pot to the soup bowls. Serve with crackers. Serves 8.

Dessert

Coconut Cake (page 161)

From the region of District 9910 / Vanuatu

4 1/2 cups coconut, fresh and grated

250 grams [1 cup + 2 tablespoons] unsalted butter 8 eggs

2 ½ cups fine sugar

2 cups self-rising flour

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (150 degrees Celsius). In a bowl using an electric mixer, whisk sugar and butter until light and creamy. Then add the eggs, one by one, into the butter and sugar thoroughly. Fold in the flour and grated coconut into the above mixture. Butter and flour a round or square 20-centimeter [8 inch] baking tin and pour mixture into it. Bake for $1\,^{1/2}$ hours.

Side Dish

Fresh Tomato Basil Pasta (page 81)

From the region of District 7190 / USA

1/2 lb. capellini

2 tablespoons olive oil

3 cloves garlic, minced

4 cups cherry tomatoes, halved

1 cup fresh basil, torn

1/3 cup dry white wine

1/4 teaspoon black pepper

1/4 cup Parmesan cheese

½ teaspoon salt

Cook capellini in boiling water for 5 minutes, then drain. Sauté garlic 1 minute in heated olive oil. Add tomatoes, wine and salt. Cook 4 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in basil and pepper. Serves 4.

Main Course

Chicken Cacciatore (page 105)

From the region of District 2030 -2120/ Italy

1 broiler chicken, cut up

1 cup flour

34 cup olive oil

1 cup sliced onion

1 cup diced mushrooms

3 cups canned tomatoes

2 cloves garlic, crushed

1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1/2 cup white wine

Pinch of oregano

Put flour in a bag with cut-up chicken. Let the flour coat the chicken. Brown chicken in oil. Remove and set aside. Add onion and sauté until tender, but not brown. Add the mushrooms and sauté about 5 minutes more. Now add the tomatoes, garlic, salt, pepper and oregano. Cover and simmer for 20-25 minutes until the chicken is done. Add wine and cook for 5 more minutes. Serve warm over noodles.
