Grant Cottage

Paul Perreault, Historian for the Town of Malta spoke to our club about Grant Cottage. He began explaining that he is a native of Cohoes and President-Elect for the Ballston Spa Rotary Club.

Ulysses S. Grant - The Necessity to Write His Memoirs:

Paul explained that he admires Ulysses S. Grant greatly. Most people think of him as a celebrated Civil War general, or a failed President of the United States. He was the first to practice Post-Napoleonic era military tactics.

He spent his last days writing his memoirs as a means of providing for his family. His son talked Grant into investing all of his money in a firm in which the son was a partner. The other partner ran out, taking all of the money with him. Grant had no other source of income. In those days former Presidents received no pension, and he had given up his right to receive a military salary when he became President.

Next to Abraham Lincoln, Ulysses S. Grant was the most admired public figure of his generation. After he died, his funeral procession went to Albany, and then to New York City (NYC). It has been said that it took 5 hours for the funeral procession in NYC to pass a single point. It included multitudes of citizens, and former union and confederate soldiers.

Memoirs:

Samuel Clements (Mark Twain) was instrumental in convincing Grant to write his memoirs, and edited the final product before it was published. The first chapter of his memoirs provides a glimpse as to what kind of man Ulysses S. Grant was. It demonstrates that he was a warm and human man, as well as a great writer. His writing style was succinct, simple and to the point. Paul explained that these tendencies were probably as a result his extensive experience in writing military orders.

Ulysses S. Grant completed his memoirs just two days before he died. Entitled *Personal Memoirs of Ulysses S. Grant*, this two volume set was the most popular selling book in the late 19th century. His family received \$400,000 in royalties from its publication. Former civil war soldiers went house to house taking subscriptions for the book.

History of Grant Cottage:

In 1878 Duncan McGregor built a four bedroom cottage on top of a mountain he had purchased in 1872. In 1881 the mountain was sold to a business group which was backed by Joseph W. Drexel. Mr. Drexel constructed the Hotel Balmoral, which become a landmark in the Saratoga area. It was Drexel who offered the cottage as a place for Grant to get away from the heat and congestion of NYC. Grant accepted this offer.

On July 16, 1885 Ulysses S. Grant arrived at Grant Cottage with his wife Julia, his grandchildren, a valet and his physician. During the time Grant spent at the cottage, he did not have many visitors; however he did have a few. One of them was Charles Wood. He offered to loan Grant \$1,500 because, as Wood stated "I owe you this for Appomattox!" Wood owned a brush factory in Lansingburgh, NY.

When Grant died, the Saratoga Chapter of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) posted a guard at Grant Cottage. The cottage had been given to the GAR, and was left as it was when Grant died there on July 23, 1885.

In December 1897, the Hotel Balmoral was destroyed by fire. By 1910, the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company had built a TB sanitarium where the hotel had been. In 1945, the sanitarium was sold to the State of New York. In 1975, a prison was built there.

In 1984, the Friends of the Ulysses S. Grant Cottage was formed and given responsibility for maintaining Grant Cottage. However, it is owned by the State of New York. Prisoners from Camp McGregor help to maintain it. They paint and do other cleanup chores.

Grant Cottage is open to visitors from Wednesday to Sunday from Memorial Day to Labor Day; and then only on the week ends till Columbus Day. Special programs include: Grant Remembrance Day, and a Victorian Tea. They receive about 2,500 visitors per year. People who visit there also have the enjoyment of a spectacular view from the east side of the mountain.
